Rosa Lea Heath was selected 1948 basketball queen.


Proving sufficient competition for the juniors and sophomores, Maxine Nitcher and George Chaney represented the senior class in the 1948 Carnival King and Queen contest.



With approximately 89,000 members. It is an "honor" or "recognition" society in the sense that students are granted membership for having performed meritorious work in dramatic arts.

Thespians work in advisory, and technical capacity for all school dramatics productions. Productions this year included the Jr. play, "Me and My Shadow;" a Christmas play, "Christmas on Erie Street"; the Senior play, "Our Town"; a radio play, "Going Somewhere"; and plans are being made for three one act plays as this is being written.


BASKETBALL


